



COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Stormy Weather

January 24, 2025 will long be remembered as the day the force of Storm Eowyn hit the Isle of Bute.

The UK's most powerful windstorm for over a decade brought damage and destruction across the island along with power and communication outages.

Within Mount Stuart's policies alone 50 trees were lost, many rural buildings lost roofs and amenity woodlands were damaged.

Our recovery plans prioritised clearance of main roads and access routes, removal of trees at risk of impacting power and telephone cables, and trees on tenanted farms which posed a danger to livestock or buildings.

Further storms on August 4 and more recently Storm Amy on October 3 & 4 have meant areas of Mount Stuart's grounds remain closed off until our hard worked woodlands team can make safe hanging branches and split trees.

Tree replanting has begun, replacing some of our lost old favourites; below are a Wisteria Sinensis and an Acer Palamtum "Emerald Lace" which will hopefully grow to become new favourites.

Some trees are being left where they've fallen, to return to nature, providing nutrients and a habitat for insects and fungi.

Age Friendly Pledge

As part of Mount Stuart's consistent drive towards inclusivity we've recently signed up for two initiatives promoting commitment to diversifying our staff and offering opportunities to as broad a section of the community as possible.

In July Mount Stuart became a Disability Confident employer. Disability Confident is a network of employers creating a movement of change, thinking differently about disability and taking action to improve how we recruit, retain and develop disabled people.

In August we signed the Age-friendly Employer Pledge, a nationwide programme run by the Centre for Ageing Better. By signing the pledge we show our commitment to older workers and making our workplace age-friendly. This means we're taking action to improve our recruitment, retention and development of workers aged 50 and over.
