Artist's Statement

With an interest in occult and esoteric symbolism, I was extremely moved by the invitation to respond to the house and grounds at Mount Stuart.

I resonated with and felt compelled to respond with a body of work that encompassed the potential of not only my own practice but that of other artists whose work embodies similar themes.

The project is inspired by the concept of Svikiro, meaning one who mediates between the spiritual and human world, receiving visions in dreams, performs healing rituals and serves as a messenger in Shona culture.

A Svikiro is considered a gifted individual who practises their craft in service of the collective. They are often imbued with specific talents such as dance, music, art in aid if healing the wider community.

With the invitation that was extended to me as an artist I chose to invite other artists and creatives to Mount Stuart to share their gifts, to create a collaborative body of work utilising experimental and innovative storytelling suggesting alternative readings of past and present, proffering a model for a decolonised future archive.

Svikiro Film (2023)

Commissioned by Mount Stuart Trust, *Svikiro* utilises academic, visual, and embodied research at Mount Stuart, collections and archives to counter ongoing erasure of a complex oracular culture that is profoundly connected to envisioning the future. This series of short films will support experimental and innovative storytelling, suggesting alternative readings of past and present, and proffering a model for a decolonised future archive built on collaboration.

These films will comprise performances in dance and song by invited artists including Alberta Whittle, Mele Broomes, and Eyve Madyise. Each adorned in beautiful bespoke costumes created in collaboration with Fiona Catherine Powell.

With themes of hyper visibility and invisibility, erasure and existence, apparitions and traces; Machache has succeeded in curating an emotive display that offers us glimpses of the diasporic experience of familial severing and habitual longing. Machache does this, while utilising literary and symbolic references, in a stunning showcase of multidisciplinary skill and collective visioning. At Mount Stuart these themes resonate with the spiritual enquiry of the Third Marquess of Bute and his embedding of religious, astrological, and mythological iconography in the architecture, decoration and fabric of the house.

Svikiro Original Song (2023)

Written, composed and performed by Eyve Madyise in collaboration with Trisha Margolis.

Svikiro refers to both the concept of spirit and to an individual whose primary role is to act as a conduit between the world of the living and realm of the ancestors.

Blue of the Horizon Indigo dye on calico fabric (2021)

Blue of the Horizon is a uniquely designed period-inspired dress. The pattern and structure of the dress was created in collaboration with artist and seamstress Fiona Catherine Powell originally created for the artist's *Divine Sky series*. In *Svikiro*, we see the dress again transporting the artist to the new spiritual realm present in the film, and in the *Poised Blue* performance by the artist within the Blue Bedroom.

In *Present Existence* Alberta Whittle and Sekai Machache braid and sew seeds into each other's hair as a gesture of care and reciprocity. Actions that have been enacted before, each gesture a repetition informed by the last, accumulative, as in previous collaborative work, some initiated by Alberta and others by Sekai and many in absent and present communication.

Artist Bio

<u>Sekai Machache</u> is a Zimbabwean-Scottish visual artist and curator based in Glasgow, Scotland. Her work is a deep interrogation of the notion of self, in which photography plays a crucial role in supporting an exploration of the historical and cultural imaginary. Aspects of her photographic practice are formulated through digital studio-based compositions utilising body paint and muted lighting to create images that appear to emerge from darkness.

In recent works she expands to incorporate other media and approaches that evoke that which is invisible and undocumented. She is interested in the relationship between spirituality, dreaming and the role of the artist in disseminating symbolic imagery to provide a space for healing against contexts of colonialism and loss.

Sekai is the recipient of the <u>2020 RSA Morton Award</u> and is an artist in residence with the Talbot Rice Residency Programme 2021-2023.

Sekai will be exhibiting at the 60th <u>La Biennale de Venezia</u> in 2024 as part of Zimbabwe's Pavilion.

Sekai works internationally and often collaboratively, for and with her community and is a founding and organising member of the <u>Yon Afro Collective (YAC)</u>

In the summer of 2021, <u>Body of Land: Ritual Manifestations</u> had its public debut at Street Level Photoworks as part of a two person solo exhibition with Kenyan artist Awuor Onyango. This project was facilitated by <u>Focas Scotland</u> and supported by the <u>British Council East Africa and Scotland</u> programmes.
